Subject: History of India (Earliest time to 1200 AD.) Class: B.A. 1st Sem.

Course Objective

- 1. In this course Student will Learn After studying this lesson understand historical construction of India's ancient past.
- 2. In this course Student will Learn about various types of source material used by ancient historians and identify changing traditions of history writing.
- 3. In this course Student will Learn The student Identify and define the world's earliest civilizations, including the Neolithic Revolution, and describe how it shaped the development of these early civilizations.
- 4. In this course Student will Learn The student Identify, describe, and compare/contrast the first advanced civilizations in the world—Mesopotamia and Egypt.
- 5. In this course Student will Learn The student Identify and describe the emergence of the earliest civilizations in Asia: the Harappan and Aryan societies on the Indian subcontinent and the Shang and Zhou societies in China.

- 1. Identify and describe the emergence of new philosophies—Daoism and Confucianism—during the Warring States period in China. Identify and describe the subsequent rise of the Qin and Han dynasties.
- 2. Identify and describe the different periods that characterized ancient Greece—Archaic Greece (or the Greek Dark Ages), classical Greece, and the Hellenistic era.
- 3. Identify and describe the characteristics of the Roman Kingdom, the Roman Republic, and Imperial Rome.
- 4. Analyze the emergence of the Mauryan and Gupta empires during the "classical age" in India
- 5. Identify and analyze the Buddhist and Vedic (Hindu) faiths.

Course Objective

- 4. Recognize the trends and patterns outlining Western Civilization and identify the questions one should ask in analyzing history.
- 5. Compare and contrast the diplomatic methods used today with those used by emperors in the International Bronze Age and identify specific examples of diplomatic methods during this period.

- 2. Identify and define an example of a city in the Levantine Corridor.
- 3. Discuss and define technological advancements during the Neolithic Age. Identify specificexamples of Mesopotamian, Egyptian, and Hittite architecture, writing, and literature. Describe the impact of these elements and what it communicates about these cultures.

Subject: Modern World History
