1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Maharishi Dayanand University, Rohtak and the curriculum prescribed by it is strictly adhered to. The institution follows strategic plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. For executing academic activities, planning is done before commencement of each academic session. The pedagogy

includes assignments, class test, oral presentations, seminars, and sessional examination. The Institution has taken initiative to start value added courses like Aptitude Reasoning -I, Aptitude Reasoning-II, Communicative English-I, Communicative English-II, Vedic Mathematics, English for Career Development, Basic mathematics for competitive examination, certificate course in communication skills, certificate course in yoga and meditation, certificate course in dynamics of service sector, certificate course in innovation and entrepreneurship, certificate course in academic research and report writing, certificate course in Ms office, internet and its application, certificate course in social impact of medicinal plants, certificate course in solar energy utilization and certificate course in fundamentals of nanoscience and nanotechnology for all round development and to impart life skills to the students. To improve teaching practices, teachers are encouraged to contribute their articles, research papers in national and international journals and to attend orientation and refresher courses. The college is sensitive to cross cutting social issues and makes every effort to sensitize the students by periodically organizing seminars/ extension lectures on Gender Equality, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics. There are specific committees that make a collective effort to raise the level of awareness amongst the students. Field trips and Industrial visits are arranged to add an experiential learning of the students. Case-studies, group discussions, hand-on training and excursions provided to enhance their knowledge. Structured feedback on curriculum, administration, teaching-learning process and infrastructure is sought from different stakeholders. Finally, the curriculum of the college is followed efficiently via well-defined process.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college is maintaining good faculty student ratio to facilitate the teaching learning process. College has taken initiatives to enhance the learning level of students by adopting student-centric methods like experiential learning that nourishes participative ability and methodologies to grow analytical skills of learners. The institute has excellent ICT facility to improve the learning experiences of students. Adequate faculty appointments with qualifications as per the UGC guidelines i.e., with Ph.D qualifications are made from time to time to maintain the quality of teaching. The institute follows various grievances redressal mechanism including online grievance redressal system for time bound grievance redressal. The transparent examination system followed by the college is evidenced from its pass percentage in the university examinations.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research and Extension committee is an important area in the combined activity of the DPG degree college. Our college has one Government fund of Rs. 5,00,000/- (Higher education). The College Research Committee bridges the gap between learning and research related activities. The Research and extension committee of the college organized 42 workshops, seminars, and training courses related to IPR, Research methods, ethics, and entrepreneurship etc. During the last 5 years, the faculty members has published number of research and review articles (91), as well books and book chapters. Further the faculty members also published in conference proceedings. Number of extension activity are carried out for sensitizing the students to social issues and holistic development through women cell and NSS. Under UNNAT BHARAT ABHIYAAN the College has adopted villages of Gurgaon district and carried out number of activities like no use of plastic and effect of tobacco on our respiratory system. In addition to Special Camps has been conducted by the college in collaboration with the Municipal Cooperation of Gurgaon, Red cross society, lions' club. Our college has signed 21 MoU for Academic and research, on job training and field visit purpose.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

DPG Degree College provides ICT Enabled spacious, well-ventilated and illuminated classrooms with good class seating occupancy for students. College possesses 03 seminar halls with adequate sitting capacity, LCD projectors, whiteboards, Internet facility. College provides 04 computer labs to students with adequate computers and with dedicated Internet LAN connection facility. College canteen/cafeteria (ISTHARA) provides fresh, hygienic and subsidized Institute provides 03 separate libraries for students. College provides 2 separate hostel facilities for both boys and girls.College has signed an MOU with nearby Pushpanjali Hospital (Civil Lines, Gurugram). DPG provides ample sports facilities to students as well as faculty members to rejuvenate themselves. College provides 13 buses (CNG) for students and faculty which runs to nearby places and cities. NSS office in college ensures moral responsibility among students. DPG Degree College provides "Open Stage" in college premises and Auditorium in college building to organize various cultural programs. College Provides a Counselling Room where team of experts help students to resolve their personal problems that might be impending their studies. Placement cell provides ample opportunities to students. DPG Degree college has installed 02 generator sets with load bearing capacity of 250 KV each. Under the Go green and Save Electricity for future prospects DPG has installed Solar panels on the roof top of both the building Block A and Block D DPG Degree College. DPG Degree College library is equipped with computers, internet and LAN facility, accessible to the students and staff. Library has a book collection of 22,943 books (as on 24-05-2023)For proper organization of the library material, library has purchased software of Education Institute of Information Management. The Library is member of DELNET (Developing Library Network). Library has subscribed J-Gate. It is an electronic gateway to global e-journal literature. The library is also a member in National Digital Library (https://ndl.iitkgp.ac.in/) (NDL). The college management has made adequate financial provisions for the maintenance of physical and academic infrastructure

College has a registered Active Alumni Association named as "DOST" which work as a bridge between existing students and alumni students, this is the platform where ex-students guides existing students about college, career guidance and motivate them to extent their contribution towards the society.

Governance, Leadership and Management

For holistic development of students the institute is already offering various value added courses such as: • Aptitude and reasoning - I and II • Communicative English - I and II • MS Office, internet and its applications • English for career development
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	As of now, the AcademicBank of Credit system is not integrated into curriculum and we do not have an option for credit bank. But the students do have an option of gaining credit through MOOC courses such as NPTEL, Coursera and SWAYAM. The college preparedness in implementation of ABC system depends upon the guidelines of affiliated university and Higher Education Department, Panchkula. For this purpose, a centralized database along with the database of the college is to be established to digitally store the academic credits earned by the student previously could be forwarded when the student enters into the program again. For monitoring ABC, proper technical support system is to be created. The college is sensitizing the students regarding the importance of ABC system.
3. Skill development:	The institution is continuously making efforts to strengthen the vocational education and soft skills of students through offering various VAC Courses and skill enhancement programs. The institution also organizes important days like Constitutional day, Independence Day, Republic Day to make the student understand the constitutional values of the nation. Further, the institution will introduce skill enhancement courses, Value Added Courses and Vocational courses along with the revised undergraduate curriculum on credit framework as per NEP 2020 implemented by University.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The Indian language (Hindi) is already a part of curriculum in undergraduate and postgraduate forum. Further, the institution will integrate Indian knowledge system (teaching in Indian language, culture, using online / offline course) in view of NEP, 2020 when the revised curriculum of university will be implemented. Further, the Institution conducts capacity building program for training its faculties to provide the classroom delivery in bi-lingual mode (Hindi/English). The institution also follows the bi-

The coordinator is typically assisted by a co-coordinator who helps to plan and execute events and programs. In addition to the coordinator and co-coordinator, the ELC also includes student representatives who help to plan and

	participate in club activities. These student representatives are typically chosen by the Principal of the college from the students at the college.

It is common for students who are above 18 years of age to be not yet enrolled as voters in the electoral roll. The College is affiliated to M.D.U. Rohtak and follows the curriculum prescribed by university and makes full efforts for proper implementation of syllabus. Following mechanisms are used for well-planned curriculum delivery.

Circulation of information regarding curriculum -

Prospectus containing information regarding program and curriculum are uploaded on website and printed for circulation (Annexures A1).

After admissions when classes are started, teachers tell the students about syllabus, exam patterns and discipline of college.

Time tables are prepared and uploaded on college notice board and website prior the commencement of semester.

Academic Calendar: The institution formulates academic calendar prior to the beginning of each semester based on calendar released by university (Annexures A2). To optimise the teaching learning process and also ensures that neither academics nor co-curricular activities are compromised, and students benefit from holistic education being offered. It includes schedule of admissions, internal examinations, tentative dates of 1QAC meetings, mentor mentee meetings, PTM and other activities for the session (Annexures A3).

Teaching Plan: The college follows structured teaching plan. The departmental time-tables are prepared in advance (**Annexure A4**). Every faculty is encouraged to prepare an active lesson plan for their classroom teaching (**Annexure A5**). The preparation of such a plan helps with effective distribution of syllabus, clarity of curriculum (**Annexure A6**) and timely completion of course. The department held regular meetings to ensure that continuous assessment is executed efficiently (**Annexure A7**).

Academic Committee: To monitor academic performance an Academic Committee consisting dean of the college and heads of various departments is formed. Chaired by Principal this committee prepares policies and various strategies are worked out for successful implementation of the curriculum.

Faculty Upgradation: To make the delivery of curriculum effective, the faculty regularly update its knowledge with the help of college support. Faculty members are encouraged to attend **Faculty Development Programmes** and present papers in seminars conducted by various universities.

Learning Beyond the Class room: To make education more meaningful, classroom teaching is supplemented with seminar, group discussions, industrial visit, term exams, tutorials, value- added courses and departmental quiz in a well-planned manner. Along with traditional chalk and talk method use of ICT based learning has been incorporated in all departments. You tube assisted learning, participative learning and problem-solving methods are also used for effective curriculum delivery.

Record of regular attendance, award list and their performance record is maintained by every faculty member and warnings are given in parents -teacher meeting to parents.

Periodic Assessment:

Progress of students is monitored through regular class tests, assignments and through sessional examination. Parents are also informed through PTM (Annexure A8). Students are also mentored through their mentors in small groups to resolve their problems.

The college is affiliated to Maharishi Dayanand University, Rohtak and adheres to the syllabus prepared by

the expert body consisting of teachers from various institutions. Environmental Science is a compulsory paper at the undergraduate level to make the students realize their duties by giving them a complete understanding of our ecosystem, pollution, biodiversity, its various causal factors and their management. NSS units and Women Cell are established to make students active participation in environmental activities. Various activities like cleanliness drive, Go Green Initiative and World Environment Day are taken care by the institute to heighten awareness and sensitivity among students and faculty. The college has installed solar panel for renewable energy and LED bulbs to save the energy and minimize environmental pollution.

Gender Sensitivity: There are specific committees and associations like Women cell that makes a collective effort to sensitize the students on area of concern like Gender equality, Human rights etc. The general atmosphere of our college, with equal opportunities of boys and girls, provides an enabling environment for gender equality. Self-defence courses for girls and other such activities are also organised. - college has Internal Assessment committee which takes measures to ensure the transparency in the internal assessment. Notification are displayed on the college notice Boards about the Internal /External Examinations to communicate the information to the students .During Pandemic time , online classes were conducted therefore all the information has been shared on the student's whatsapp groups by the Subject teachers as well as the Mentors.
- The attendance record of the student which is an Integral part of the Internal assessment has been uploaded by the the teachers on ERP(Enterprise Resource planning System) on regular basis .Students can directly access their attendance from their Mobile phones and report if any discrepancy found &could be rectified .
- Answer scripts of Internal examination have been shown to the students if they are not satisfied with the marks awarded to them they could approach to the concerned teacher .if their Grievances are not resolved satisfactorily they are free to approach their Mentors , Head of the Department. if the student is not satisfied with the action he/she can approach to the Head of the Institution

Though it is not a direct income but it reduces the electricity expenditures. The major area of expenditures of the college is salary of teaching staff. Salary expenses increases every year. Other than the salary, development and maintenance of infrastructure is an import side of expenditures. College is also spending the funds for the purchase of library books and equipments for the various labs of science and other practical subjects. Cleanliness of the campus is also an important task. For this expenditure on material for housekeeping purchased, Electricity expenditures, website expenditures, university office fees, and purchase of stationary.

The accounts of the college are audited regularly by external auditors and Chartered Accountants.

The Finance Committee has been constituted to monitor all the financial activities of the college and to prepare estimated the yearly budget of the college .The Balance Sheets and audited Statements of Accounts including audit reports are approved by the management and the Governing body.

BEST PRACTICE I

1. Title of the Best Practice

Sustainable & Green Campus

2. The Context

Today there is a great need for conservation because we are facing several environment problems. The main caused behind these problems is that human beings are consuming natural resources at a much quicker pace than they can be replenished. Also, Pollution is a very serious concern in the NCR region due to heavy traffic, deforestation and urbanization. Our main focus behind this Green campus program is to

ensure the sustainability of sufficient resources for our future generation. Any new development should consider and maintain the proper balance of economic, social and environmental conditions. More stress is being given on the proper infrastructure development so as to continue and maintain the green practices.

3. Objectives of the Practice

We have identified the following objectives which are in tune with the practice

- 1. To promote awareness of environmental issues among the students, staff and society.
- 2. To achieve better sustainability on the campus and improve the quality of life of all the stakeholders.
- 3. To conserve water resources through rainwater harvesting.
- 4. To plant rare and medicinal/herbal plants on the college campus

5. To use renewable energy resources (solar energy).

4. The Practice

Campus-wide initiatives at reducing, reusing and recycling are helping it achieve a green code of living which includes:

• Use of renewable energy: Installation of a modern and hi-tech rooftop Solar PV system. On an average, the solar energy fulfils 31% of the electricity consumption of the college with a maximum of percentage solar consumption clicking in the month of March, 2022 (76.87%).

• **Energy Conservation**: The policy on energy conservation highlights on developing a proactive and progressive approach to providing energy efficient, responsible, and cost-effective operations on campus. LED lighting to reduce heat load, as well as abundant natural light makes the building energy efficient.

• Water harvesting: Rain water harvesting system with pipes going well below ground level.

• **Sewage management**: Sewage treatment plant to ensure zero discharge to municipal sewer line with plans to use treated water for horticulture. Garbage handed over to MCGfor proper disposal. No hazardous waste produced on campus.

• Plantations: Lush green gardens all around the campus.

• **E-waste management**: Disposal of e-waste is an emerging global environment and a public health issue. All loosely discarded e-waste is collected at the institute and handed over to external vendors.

5. Evidence of Success

This best practice has proven to be successful through the following activities:

a. Through periodical tree plantations, Flora and Fauna on the campus has enriched, which has turned into eco-friendly campus.

b. Out of total required, approx. 31% electrical power consumption per month is met through the use of Solar Energy.

c. Green audit and Energy audit of the campus is done to display the green efficiency of college.

d. A mandatory course on Environmental awareness at B.A/B.Sc. /B. Com level.

e. Water conservation methods employed are helping maintaining gardens and campus green and ecofriendly.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

While carrying out this practice, following problem are encountered by the college.

a. Green Campus initiatives are challenging so it requires determination and a long-term assurance from all the stakeholders.

b. Good public transport in the neighbourhood is need so that use of personal vehicles can be discouraged.

c. Green Campus initiative is rather expensive practice. It needs an expert advice and investment of resources.

d. University needs government support for taking many green initiatives like installing more solar panels, installing automatic switches for saving electricity, equipment for measuring air quality and Recycling machines.

e. Being in NCR, pollution levels in this area are generally higher hence government help to reduce pollution in the neighbourhood help the university in maintaining green and pollution free campus.

BEST PRACTICE II

1. Title of the Practice

Mentoring system for students

2. Objectives of the Practice

To minimize dropouts, improve performance and reduce stress of the students through personal counselling.

3. The Context

Students undergo various problems of stress- personal, academic, physical, mental. Students are new to professional college life. It creates a lot of stress, especially to hostel students who are away from family for the first time. Students from educationally weak background feel complex and hesitations in class and unable to perform well due to inhibitions. One solution therefore is a 'Mentor' who can form the bond with students in the true sense. Mentoring is required for students to achieve emotional stability and to promote clarity in thinking and decision making for overall progress.

4. The Practice

• They meet at least once a month to discuss, clarify and share various problems which may be personal or academic, etc.

• The mentors encourage the students to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities and sports.

- Their academic performance and other activities are all recorded.
- • The mentors also counsel the students in need of emotional problems.

• When the students have any problem in any department either with the staff or with work completion the mentors speak with the respective staff and sorts out the problem.

• Mentors take special care of weak students, who are given advice on how to study, prepare a time table for study and clarify the doubts and also given notes to study.

• Chief Mentor of department takes the progress of counselling of students by mentors.

• Students problems are discussed with the departmental heads, other faculties and necessary action taken to solve it.

5. Evidence of Success

Evidence of success of the practice includes university ranks, better results in the examinations, improved attendance, less drop outs, increased participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, better discipline on campus and respectful relationship between teachers and students.
